 - o 2003 NCAA National Championship
 - *Women of Troy finished the season with a perfect 35-0 record – only the fourth team to ever accomplish the feat.*
 - *USC also became only the fifth team to win back-to-back titles.*
 - *Team also set an NCAA record by winning 47 consecutive matches.*
 - *Haley became USC's first-ever National Coach of the Year in volleyball.*
 - o 2002 NCAA National Championship
 - *First national title for the Women of Troy in over 20 years.*
